Environmental management/features

The Old Course at Broken Sound Club is an Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary. The ACSP is an education and certification program

that helps golf courses protect our environment and preserve the natural heritage of the game of golf.

In 2011, the Broken Sound Club was awarded the GEO Certification. Being only the second golf course facility in the United States to be honored by the United Nations (U.N.) sponsored organization. Broken Sound is also a Platinum Club, voted top 75 in excellence.

Broken Sound was chosen as one of three finalist in United States businesses less than \$100 million for its recycling program. The Florida State Department of Environmental Protection has honored Broken Sound Club for achieving a 92 percent recycling rate.

Water conservation, management and/or controls:

The Old Course at Broken Sound uses reclaimed water for irrigation to help preserve the local coral reefs.

Interesting notes about the course:

Tucked away in a wooded setting, this non-residential course reflects a northern atmosphere. Renovated in 2003, the Old Course boasts distinctive bunkers and rolling terrain. The Old Course encompasses much more water than before, and stone bridges and accents compliment the array of oak trees. The Old Course is one of the few in south Florida without any homes on it. Recently, Office Depot built its world headquarters along the second and third holes.

Broken Sound Club will be undertaking a complete renovation in the summer of 2014.
