Interesting and historical courserelated facts

The Kraft Nabisco Championship is one of two tournaments (Masters) that has been played on the same golf course (Dinah Shore Tournament Course) since its inception in 1972. The Kraft Nabisco Championship, formerly the Colgate-Dinah Shore and the Nabisco Dinah Shore, celebrated its 40th anniversary in 2011. Designated a "major" tournament by the LPGA in 1983, the traditional victory leap into Champions Lake at the 18th hole has evolved into one of the most thrilling finishes in all of professional golf.

Dinah Shore was the recipient of the 1993 Old Tom Morris Award. The annual award is GCSAA's highest award, recognizing an individual for their lifetime contributions to golf.

In 2007, Mission Hills Country Club was the host of the GCSAA National Championship, with Jason Regan, golf course superintendent at Pine Ocala Country Club in Ocala, Fla., winning the title. Desmond Muirhead, 1970
