Vancouver Golf Club includes lakes, streams and forrests.

Vancouver Golf Club makes use of wetting agents, soil moisture sensors and irrigation audits to control water use and conserve resources.

Abnormal weather conditions/occurrences in the last 12 months that affected the course:

Vancouver experienced a warm, dry winter in 2014/2015.

Predominate species of trees on course:

Douglas fir; Red cedar

Interesting notes about the course:

The front nine at Vancouver Golf Club, with its traditional size greens and mountain vistas, plays to a variety of elevation changes while the back nine offers a flatter layout, with each fairway tree lined with dense first and second growth forest.

The course was designed by H.T. (Mike) Gardner in the early 1900s and the routing of the course remains the same with the exception of two holes.

Before 1910, the front nine of the course was a working farm.

No. 1 and 4 bunker complexes were recently rebuilt.
