Environmental management/features

Golden Ocala Golf & Equestrian Club sprays predominant fertilizer in small amounts and all organic waste is recycled on the property.

Water conservation, management and/or controls:

Golden Ocala uses effluent water when available and uses extensive hand watering for greens. The computer controlled irrigation system has been developed to be more refined and more need-specific to significantly reduce nightly watering. The nozzles on the sprinklers throughout the golf course are used to reduce flow rates and save water.

Abnormal weather conditions/occurrences in the last 12 months that affected the course:

Over the last 12 months, Golden Ocala has endured three extreme rain events in excess of four inches, causing significant washout in bunkers and pine straw beds, as well as errosion of lake banks.

Unusual wildlife on the course

Coyotes; Wild turkeys

Predominate species of trees on course:

Pine and oak

Interesting notes about the course:

Golden Ocala opened in 1986 as public course with eight tribute holes recreating some of the games' most iconic locations, including Augusta National and St. Andrews.

Comments overheard about the course:

Members of Golden Ocala like to say the 10 non-tribute holes are as good, if not better, than the tribute holes.

Significant changes recently made to the course:

The course went through a full bunker renovation in the fall of 2014, with G-angle sand added. During summer 2014, the course expanded 11 greens to recapture green area that was lost, as well as slope modification on six greens to allow for hole locations near the water during tournament events.
