Environmental management/features

Ten-Mile Creek wanders through Highland Meadows Golf Club, with several non-irrigated areas that are left to grow tall to minimize maintenance along the waterway and throughout the course.

Water conservation, management and/or controls:

Highland Meadows recently upgraded its water source from the creek to wells, which will allow for proper and more efficient operation of sprinklers, with less overall environmental impact. The course also upgraded water management software to a more efficient and advanced system.

Predominate species of trees on course:

Various pines (white, Austrian, Scotch); Norway spruce; various maple and oak

Rebunkering of tournament hole No. 5.
