Environmental management/features

Water conservation, management and/or controls:

Ninety-five percent of the golf course at Park Hyatt Resort Aviara is irrigated with recycled water.

Abnormal weather conditions/occurrences in the last 12 months that affected the course:

Three years of drought conditions in Southern California has helped cause wild fires, which did damage to the northeast corner of the golf course on No. 13 and 14 in May 2014. The golf maintenance crew battled the flames helping to protect golf course and homes.

So far this winter, the rainfall has been closer to normal levels for the area.

Predominate species of trees on course:

Eucalyptus; Torrey pines; Italian stone pines; Jacaranda

Interesting notes about the course:

Green No. 16 measures 65 yards from front to back, which is longer than the longest NFL field goal.
