Interesting and historical courserelated facts

Harbour Trees Golf Club is located in Noblesville, Ind., on Morse Lake. This 18-hole championship course is surrounded by North Harbour. Harbour Trees opened in 1973 when The Shorewood Corporation started developing the subdivision and became an equity club when Shorewood sold the club to the members in 1979. Being in the heart of a housing development, Harbour Trees is a family-oriented club.

Pete Dye had the golfer in mind when he designed this course. Players of all skill levels can enjoy their round of golf. It is challenging but fair and difficult even for highly skilled golfers.

Harbour Trees has all of the attributes for which Pete Dye is noted: the use of railroad ties to buttress the land; small, uniquely shaped and rolling greens; and a variety of unique and well designed golf holes. The par 3 No. 18 is the signature hole and plays approximately 175 yards over water to a sloping green that is tucked around an inlet of Morse Lake.

In 1996, a major tee project was completed. which included repositioning and rebuilding all tees. The course now offers four tee stations from which players can choose. In 1993, a complete renovation of all the sand bunkers, including new drainage, new white sand and recontouring the face and walls of the bunkers was completed. In 1990, a new watering system was installed to protect against a future drought.
