City of Los Angeles

- Public Utilities Department services 716,531 connections
- Operates solely on funds from rates and service charges
- Over 3.8 million people
- Covers 465 square miles
- Approximately 602,057 residential accounts and 60,056 commercial accounts



Sources of Water



Water Rates



- 100% volumetric (no fixed monthly charges)
- Two-tiered, increasing block rate structure to encourage conservation
- First tier rate applies to basic water use, while second tier rate applies to higher water usage
- Rate structure accounts for temperature zone, lot size, household size

 Conservation Plan
 Ordinance 1990
- Landscape Ordinance -1996, updated in 2009 to comply with new State Model Landscape





PROHIBITED USES

Revised Water Conservation Ordinance



SPRINKLER USE RESTRICTIONS

Your street address determines the days on which watering with sprinklers is permitted:

Odd numbers: Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays Even numbers: Tuesdays, Thursdays, Sundays

Sprinkler use is allowed before 9:00 a.m. and after 4:00 p.m. only, for up to 8 minutes per station per watering day. Customers with water-conserving nozzles (rotors and multi-stream rotary heads) are allowed two 15-minute cycles each watering day.

OTHER PROHIBITED USES OF WATER

- Watering of any hard surfaces such as sidewalks, walkways, driveways or parking areas unless flushing is needed to protect health and safety;
- Outdoor watering between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.;
- Outdoor watering when it is raining;
- Allowing runoff onto streets and gutters from excessive watering;
- Allowing leaks from any pipe or fixture to go unrepaired;
- Washing vehicles without using a hose with a self-closing water shut-off nozzle;
- Serving water to customers in restaurants unless requested.

- Using water to clean, fill or maintain decorative fountains unless the water is part of a recirculating system;
- Installing single-pass cooling systems in new buildings;
- Installing non-recirculating systems in new car wash and commercial laundry systems; and
- Allowing large landscape areas to be watered without rain sensors that shut off irrigation systems.

The Ordinance also requires that hotel and motel operators provide guests with the option of not having towels and linens laundered daily.

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
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AUGUST 2010 UPDATE

Emergency Water Regulations

- August 2008 Revised existing Ordinance and began implementation of Phase I mandatory restrictions
- June 2009 Increased mandatory conservation requirements

Southern California Water Supply



- 3 year drought and pumping restrictions in California have strained water supplies
- Mayor calls for voluntary water conservation in June 2007
- LADWP implemented Phase III and 15% shortage year rates effective June 1, 2009

Water Conservation Ordinance Basics

- No irrigation between the hours of 9:00AM and 4:00 PM, except for greens and tees
- Recycled water exempt
- Decorative fountains require re-circulating systems
- Rain sensors are required
- No pavement wash-down
- Vehicle washing requires self-closing nozzle




Water Conservation Ordinance Basics – Phase III

- All Phase I restrictions still apply
- LADWP customers can only irrigate on Mondays and Thursdays



Issues for Golf Courses


- Two-day-a-week watering may not provide a long enough watering window to irrigate the whole course
- Events/tournaments could conflict with available watering days
- No exemptions for overseeding and reestablishment of turf



Alternative Means of Compliance

- The City of Los Angeles Emergency Water Conservation Plan was amended in August 2009 to allow for an alternative means of compliance
- Large Landscape Areas can be exempt from the number of watering days, if they can reduce their consumption by 20% versus their 2006/2007 base water usage or a budget calculated by Landscape Water Manager

Landscape Water Manager Budget Program



Alternative Compliance Requirements



- Must have approved weather-based irrigation
- Must reduce overall monthly water use by 20% from customer baseline
- Must use recycled water if available

How to Apply for Alternative Compliance

- Send request letter to LADWP that includes;
 - general information such as property address, meters, square footage, weather based irrigation information
 - brief statement of how you will achieve 20% water use reduction
 - primary contact for compliance application process
- Include all supporting documents such as photos, maps, and/or drawings

Approval & Tracking

- LADWP will provide 2006/2007 usage and MAWA water budget
- LADWP will send approval letter
- LADWP will track consumption monthly on a rolling 12 month basis to confirm that each course is saving 20% over chosen budget
- 1 month over budget will result in warning.
 Subsequent months will have monetary penalties. Continued violations may result in removal from program

Commercial CA-Friendly Landscape Incentive Program

- Launched in October 2009
- •Pays \$1 per square foot of turf removed and replaced with the following:
 - California-friendly plants
 - Permeable hardscapes and mulch
- Pre-Inspection Post-Inspection Payment
- New landscape must remain for 15 years








GPCD COMPARISON
