Additional Notes

- Renovation in 2019 included: changing greens from bentgrass to Champion G12 bermudagrass; changing tees, fairways, collars and approaches from 419 bermudagrass to Trinity zoysiagrass; changing rough from 419 bermudagrass to TifTuf Bermudagrass' and updating irrigation system from hydraulic to electric.

- The 2019 renovation also had some reshaping of greens and addition of tees.

- Area had a rough two winters without a normal growing season heading into event.

- Wildlife on course includes ducks, coyotes, bobcats, geese, rabbits and hawks.
