Notable

- Renovation Notable:
 - Layout remained similar except for four holes moved locations to make hole to hole transition better.
 - Entire site was lifted anywhere from 2-4' in some locations.
 - Entire site has a 12'scand cap with 75% of sand mined from the site by excavating the waterways.
 - 300,000 cubic yards of material was moved in the construction process.
 - USGA spec greens
- Colder than normal April did not allow grass to grow much.
- F35 fighter jets and Blackhawk helicopters are flown out of nearby Truax Field, which is home to the 115th fighter wing of the National Guard.

- Leonard played golf at Kishwaukee College after earning firstteam all-conference honors four times in high school.
- Maintenance staff is fairly veteran with six members who have been there more than eight years and one for 18 years with Leonard.
