• All course preparations during tournament week will be done in the dark due to lack of daylight hours.

• 30 trees were lost due to a microburst June 3. Area also saw extended drought in June and third hottest July on record.

• 2017 renovation brought back Ross' original bunker scheme, green and fairway dimensions and teeing grounds. Grassfaced bunkers were reshaped into flash face bunker clusters. Green dimensions were pushed out to their original contours and dimensions. Elevated tee boxes were flattened to at-grade, free-form teeing grounds.
