Notable

- This is very early for a non-overseeded bermudagrass course.
- Winter was very difficult with weather extremes of overcast, cold, wet, very warm, covering greens and 25 to 80-degrees in 10 days.
- No. 9 was lengthened and yardage added from last year's 6,889 and is the longest U.S. course so far on this year's tour.
- Course should play longer, rough is more mature, and greens, which are less than two years old, will play firm and fast.
- After the tournament some of the collar grass will be replaced due to contamination issues.
- After the 2023 tournament, the course underwent a renovation which included USGA greens, bunkers, full irrigation, an expansion and leveling of tees, and a new warm-up putting green behind #1 tee.

- Other changes included a new greenside bunker on No. 7 and the waste bunker on #8 was extended.
- \bullet GCSAA First Green presented by Tetra Technologies is in its 2^{nd} year at the tournament with the focus of introducing and educating youth on the STEAM aspects of the golf industry and beyond.
