### **Additional Notes**

• Playing surface will be bermudagrass as opposed to the *Poa trivialis* greens and perennial rye tees, fairways and rough that is in season when the tournament has been played in April.

• Nearly an acre of turf has been added by reducing the size of beds and waste areas. Fairways were widened on holes 1, 2, 3, 6, 8, 11, 12, 13, 15 and 16.

• Bunker faces and banks throughout most of the course were recently resurfaced and re-established.
