Additional Notes

• The club was without power for 14 days and closed until Nov. 1 after Hurricane Ida hit August 29, 2021. Nine acres of wooded areas had to be removed along with an additional 700 trees on the property. The most notable lost tree was in the middle of No .11 fairway. 400 new trees have been added to the property since the hurricane.

• Recent years renovations involved the courses bunkers with some restored to their original shape. The larger fairway and greenside bunkers are now smaller.

• The goal of recent renovations has been to ensure that the course drains more efficiently since most of it lies below sea level.
