Notable

- 2015 renovation included two new holes on Dunluce and changes made to all holes in some form.
- 2023-24 renovations included a new championship tee on Dunluce No. 4 and new front 9 on the Valley links, a new range and new roads.
- Front left portion of No. 1 green adjusted to allow for a pin position. No. 7 green was rebuilt to soften the contours.
- Area had drought in the spring, but regular rainfall thru June.
- Major construction last year to increase hospitality areas (30% more square footage of tents than 2019).
- Course has been GEO Certified since 2014.

- Environmental steps include more than 200 solar panels installed across the site with battery storage, bio diesel used to fuel equipment (approximately 90% less emissions), use of lithium mowers and carts, bio gas and smart heating system to heat clubhouse.

- There are more than 130 different grasses and plants throughout the site with some of them registered as rare to the area.
