- Routing for the tournament is a composite of the facilities' three nines. Tournament holes in order include 1-7 of East Course, 2-6 of Center Course, and 4-9 of West Course.
- Course hosted the 1974 U.S. Amateur (won by Jerry Pate).
- Course has hosted a number of events, including the 1935 Ryder Cup, 2001 Senior PGA Championship and the PGA TOUR's Barclays in 2008 and 2010.
- The Ridgewood Country Club is a certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary.
- Superintendent Todd Raisch is a Certified Golf Course Superintendent (CGCS).

Routing of the Championship Course is 1-7 (1-7 East), 8-12 (2-6 Center), 13-18 (4-9 West)

Architect:

A.W. Tillinghast, 1929. Tillinghast was a member at RCC and lived in nearby Harrington Park, NJ.

Current property is the 4th site for the Club. Tillinghast was given 3 properties to choose from when the Club decided to move from Ridgewood to Paramus. The other two sites ended up as golf courses as well.

The hole names above were coined by Tillinghast.

Current consulting architect is Gil Hanse. Began with Club in 1995, first building the short game area next to 18. Completed master plans for the club in 2000 and 2011. Major restoration of the course in 2015, redoing bunkers, green & fairway expansions. Gil is an honorary member of RCC.

In 1996, the course was the 2nd course in NJ certified as an Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary.

Trees: Predominantly oak, some tulips, maples, ash. Approximately 6,000 trees have been removed since 2000. In 2013, a tornado was responsible for approximately 500 trees coming down between 13 green and 18 green.

Hole Notes:

- #1 Only hole in the 300's in terms of yardage.
- #2 The back left bunker used to be a small pond as originally designed, hence the name "Water" The spring to feed the pond is still active and has been re-directed into the bunker drainage.
- #3 Fairway runs out on the right at 320 yards into the mounds, 346 on the left. The grass covered mounds at 3 and 13 were Tillinghast's version of his "great hazard" based on Hell's Half Acre (the 7th at Pine Valley), a feature that he replicated on many of his courses, usually with sand...4th Bethpage Black, 17th Baltusrol Lower, 14th Baltimore CC (East), 9th Somerset Hills.
- #4 Usually the wettest fairway at RCC, NJ Freshwater Wetland Map has the line going right down the middle of the fairway.
- #10 Call by members "cemetery hole" due to the cemetery next to it. At 2PM on Sunday, George Washington Memorial Park will ring its bells, including Amazing Grace, echoing through the course.
- #12 Called "5 and dime" or "nickel, dime" by the members due to how former assistant golf professional, Byron Nelson would play the hole, with a five iron, then a wedge. The original design for this hole by Tillinghast had the green further up the hill next to where the bathroom sits today. Member leadership wanted it placed lower on the hill. The members won. The disagreement persisted for several months, long after the other greens were seeded. After agreeing on the final location, to be able to open the green with the others, sod had to be taken from the previous course's greens in Ridgewood.
- #13 While the longest hole at RCC, it also normally plays directly into the prevailing wind. Is Gil Hanse's favorite hole at RCC.
- #14 Lee Trevino once described this green as a "pretzel."
- #16 The last USGA event at RCC, the 2016 Girls' Jr. ended on this hole with Eun Jeong Seong beating Andrea Lee 4&2.
- #17 The giant tulip tree protecting the right side of the hole on the right has fought off a lightning strike. Jerry Pate defeated John Grace in the 1974 Amateur on this hole, winning 2&1.

Additional Notes

- Since 2012 the course has done in-house renovations, including bunkers, tees, tree removal and practice facilities.
- Course has turned 40 acres of rough into native fescue areas to reduce inputs in those areas.
- Wildlife on the course includes fox, coyotes and hawks.
- There are four golf courses within a square mile of each other, including U.S. Amateur host Ridgewood Country Club.

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
