• Only spray insecticides once per year (on greens only) with minimal fungicide needs... Weather station aids in water scheduling and perimeter sprinkler heads are adjustable... High winds blow sand out of the bunkers, which crew has to replenish.

• Wildlife on course include elk, deer, coyotes, blue herons, bald eagles, hawks.
