# From superintendent Joel Ehrhart:

"Summer of 2024 was one for the record books for Lakewood National. We received 110" of rain. Of the three named storms we had Tropical Storm Debbie was by far the worst. Our weather station recorded 18 inches of rain in a 12-hour period. This resulted in widespread flooding from the Braden River onto the course. Due to the rainfall and flooding the bunkers on the commander were severely damaged, many completely collapsed, eroded, contaminated and completely washed of sand. We had to act very quickly with season right around the corner. With the damages being too significant for my team to repair the club decided to move our bunker renovation which was due to start in May of 2025 to October 2024. Luckily, we were able to lock in a contractor and get started two weeks after the storm. Knowing the significance of our bunkering we decided to get to Brandon Johnson course architect involved to restore the bunkers to their original design. We were able to open all 18 holes by December 6<sup>th</sup>. All bunkers were brought back to their original design and lined with bunker solutions. During the renovation we made a few changes to some bunkers that connected to the paths on tournament holes 4 and 5. Previously the bunkers on the holes were often a ruling issue because it was hard to decipher if you were on shell path or bunker. W made the decision to separate the areas with an area of turf to prevent contamination to our new bunkers and help alleviate any potential ruling issues."
